- Research Methods
- Research Findings and Discussion
- Conclusions!
- Future Directions
- Reference List/Bibliography

#### Structuring Bibliographic Research

The 8 steps of topic analysis (aka the 8 pillars of bibliographic wisdom):

- Systems and serendipity
- Topic identification and description
- Search vocabulary: the key(words) to the kingdom
- Truncation know your symbols!?\*#
- Call numbers know your addresses
- <u>Search documentation track your sources</u>
- <u>Search documentation cite your sources</u>
- Document assessment know (and be able to defend) your sources
